Wombats eat wallaby grass, roots, shrubs, native grass, snow grass, kangaroo grass and trees. They get their food at night and that means they are nocturnal. Wombats have big, sharp claws to catch their food. They are covered in fluffy fur, to keep them warm. Their big, black nose is for smelling or sensing for food.

They also have a pouch that is backwards.

# **SCHOOL NEWS**




